# Message to FOSC Members

from Park Manager Kristen Comella

*2022 was an exciting year.*

*After many years of planning and fund-raising, we formally opened the “Tortoise Walk”, culminating in a beautiful seating area and 4,200-pound sculpture of a Mojave desert tortoise. This path and vibrant displays will be enjoyed by visitors of all ages for years to come.*

*Park Naturalist, Phenix Johnson, was able to purchase a Celestron NexStar 8SE telescope. This fine instrument has allowed her to expand our education programs and bring our night skies to life for both Friends members and the public-at-large.*

*We launched our new volunteer Park Docent program. Viewed as the “little sister” to our Trail Stewards program, this exciting effort allows Friends members to serve as part of our “education team”. Docents’ ability to provide education programs will expand the number of visitors we can reach and expand the breadth and depth of our public offerings.*

*Your passion, dedication, and continued support made these projects possible, and are part of what makes Snow Canyon such a special and loved place. We look forward to 2023, more exciting projects, and seeing you in and around the park.*

## 2022 in Review

2022 marked the tenth anniversary of the founding of Friends of Snow Canyon. In 2011, Kristen Comella, Park Manager, gathered a number of local residents to discuss the feasibility of forming a Friends group to support the Park. State budget cuts over a number of years were having a negative effect on the Park. Kristen thought a Friends group could help, both through active volunteerism and a level of fund-raising. Over the following months, a board of directors was formed, by-laws written and in February of 2012, the FOSC received its 501(c)3 non-profit charitable organization designation. Ever since, FOSC has provided the support that Kristen envisioned, continuing to grow and increase its activities and funding capabilities.

2022 was not without challenges. The world is still in the grips of a pandemic and society has had to adapt. The board has maintained a conservative approach to COVID, holding its meetings by Zoom in the early months of the year and restricting member events to those that could be held outside. Those restrictions have been lifted but masks are still welcome, though not required, at all FOSC events.

2022 marked the completion of FOSC’s largest funding project, an increase in the number of trail stewards to an all-time high and membership also reaching a new record high. Thank you to all of our members for your continued support!

## Supporting the Mission of the Park

### A. *Preserve and Protect.*

1. **Member Opportunities.** Snow Canyon State Park offers unique hiking, camping, biking and less rigorous opportunities to commune with one of the most awe-inspiring landscapes in the country. The Park protects wildlife, plants and, yes, even rocks. Members of FOSC contribute to the enjoyment of the tens of thousands who flock to the Park and the preservation of those precious resources directly through volunteerism and indirectly through funding. In 2022, members participated in service projects that included:
  - March 1, Sahara mustard removal
  - April 1, graffiti removal from the Petrified Dunes area
  - May 10, revegetating the area around Upper Galoot with native plants
2. **Docent Program.** New in 2022 is a Docent Program, initiated by Park Naturalist Phenix Johnson. Beginning with 5 docents, this program will have docents out in the Park, setting up exhibit tables at popular trailheads to provide information about specific areas of interest, such as wildlife or geology.
3. **Trail Stewards Program.** This program is supported by Friends of Snow Canyon and is staffed by dedicated volunteers who serve as goodwill ambassadors to the Park. Under the joint leadership of FOSC volunteer Don Hite and Assistant Park Manager Jordan Perez, Trail Stewards provide invaluable service to both our visitors and to the resource itself. Stewards meet and greet visitors to the Park's trails, providing advice on trails to use and to answer questions about the Park's flora and fauna, its geology, and its local history. Stewards work independently to maintain trails as they roam the Park on their hikes. They also participate in work parties to improve trails, under the supervision of Jordan Perez. Projects this year included work on Lava Flow, Toe, Johnson Canyon, Red Sands, Whiterocks and Pioneer Names trails. In 2022, FOSC purchased new vests for all trail stewards, replacing vests that were too hot in summer and faded and frayed for those stewards who have served for a number of years.

During the hot summer months when many stewards retreat to cooler climes, a cadre of 12 year-round stewards participate in an adopt-a-trail program. Each picks a favorite trail and commits to giving that trail extra attention during the summer. These volunteers brave scorching temperatures to make sure the trails are in top condition for all visitors.

Seven new stewards were added during the year, bringing the total to 61, an all-time high. The group contributed 2700 volunteer hours to the Park, also a new record. Don Hite, Jordan Perez and the FOSC Board all pass along their thanks for the stewards' contributions and fine work.

**B. Provide Public Awareness and Educational Events.**

1. FOSC sponsors educational and fun events during the non-summer months for the enjoyment and education of members. In 2022, these events included:

- November 15, Snow Canyon State Park Through the Eyes of a Geologist with George Otott
- November 22, Yoga in the Park with John Yohman

2. We maintain an informative website featuring flora and fauna of the Park, a description of upcoming events, biographies of the Board, and links to park resources. The website is used for event sign-ups, donations, new membership sign-ups and membership renewals. New in 2022 is a Core Plants page where plants can be identified by locating an image of the plant. A click on the image will bring up information on the plant. Also new is a News page with current information on FOSC happenings, flowers in bloom and a link to our YouTube channel. The YouTube channel includes recordings of past Zoom educational events.

3. We electronically send FOSC newsletters to all members. These newsletters present current park-related information as well as FOSC updates and information. A total of 6 member newsletters were distributed in 2022.

**C. *Promote the Development of Facilities.***

In years past, Friends of Snow Canyon relied solely on annual memberships and donations to support Park improvements. Recently, we have more actively sought grants from charitable foundations and so have been able to help fund larger projects. In 2022, a grant from the John C. Kish Foundation allowed us to make a major contribution for the new Tortoise Walk that was unveiled in September. A new grant from the Kish Foundation as well as a grant from the Ironman Foundation have given us a head start on the next proposed project, a shade pavilion for the Chuckwalla Trailhead. Based on planning and requests by Park Manager Kristen Comella, FOSC provided a total of almost \$36,000 to the Park for the following:

1. \$150 for chain for the Jenny Canyon parking area
2. \$27,700 for the Tortoise Walk sculpture, benches, chat and opening ceremony
3. \$2000 for Trail Steward vests and name badges
4. \$325 for Jr Ranger badges
5. \$4000 for Park brochures
6. \$500 for bike safety signs
7. \$300 for trail sign decals
8. \$850 for the new Park telescope
